Demolition of the Pavilion

The Council have decided this old building near Comiston Road is unsafe, and we hear that demolition is imminent. This set us wondering about the history of the building: so far we have established that it was used by the tram crews as a rest stop – it had toilet and kitchen facilities – and also as a base by the park keepers, back in the day when there were dedicated 'Parkies' to oversee the larger parks. So far we have not managed to find any photos of the Pavilion in better days: please contact us if you have any photos or memories of it!

Funding for Cherry Trees

We were delighted to receive a generous award of £5000 from the AEB Charitable Trust! This will enable us to continue replacing the cherry trees which form part of the Trefoil, originally planted in 1935 by members of the Guiding organisation.

We hope with this funding, together with some donations from Friends, to be able to plant around 18 to 20 new trees. The Council's tree officer will select species which will give a variety of colour and blossom times, and Edinburgh and Lothians Greenspace Trust will help with the planting and after-care – this should take place late in the Autumn.



New Picnic Tables!

The Wednesday Brownies received a Tesco Community Award to assist with "combatting loneliness through outdoor meetings". We agreed to support them with setting up picnic tables as a base for their outdoor meetings, and were fortunate to receive a further award from the Council's Community Grants Funds. The combined funding will cover the cost of three robust and vandal-proof picnic benches.



Two will be sited fairly close together so larger groups can use them (one will be wheel-chair-friendly), near to the main entrance. The third will be further into the park, past the theatre. We thank our local parks officer, who has helped with the planning and sourcing of the tables, and the expenses of setting up the bases for them. What we want now is a glorious Summer so they will be well used!

Mural Art in the Park?

Inspired by the recent transformation of the Colinton Tunnel a small group of Friends have come together to understand the difference that some art work could make to the Park. We have made contact with the professional muralist who worked on the Colinton Tunnel, Chris Rutterford. He would seem to be an obvious choice as he has known the Park all his life and at one stage lived in a house that backed on to it.

Whilst the relationship between Chris and the Friends is yet to be formalised he has already opened our eyes to some of the possibilities far beyond what started out as a simple desire to replace the graffiti on the buildings with something relevant and attractive that would deter those armed with spray cans. Chris has ideas for all areas of the Park but we believe we should work on a small area first that will help us understand how best to deal with all the interested parties, the schools and school children, the Council and the audience. Look out for updates on the Park noticeboards and in future editions of the Valley Voice.
