Volunteering: because everyone gains!

Brian Smith, inspired by the belief that volunteering has all-round benefits for individuals, organisations and communities, has begun work as our Volunteer Coordinator.

FOBVP taps on members for various tasks, and in addition local schoolchildren and uniformed organisations have regularly taken on projects. Recently we have also had offers from workplaces, such as the Lloyds Banking Group, who sent 50 volunteers; they were tasked with cutting back overhanging growth outside the railings at the South East end, and despite a wet day, set about it with a will! Other highly visible examples of volunteer activity include the re-painting of the gas regulator building within the Main Gate, very efficiently carried out by the Scouts, and the ongoing work on Dianne's Garden by the U3A volunteers.

Brian plans ahead, maintaining a list of work to be done, and fitting the task to the season and to the size and age of the group when approached with an offer of help, as well as asking our own members for assistance with specific projects. Watch out for requests for workparties: these can be for skilled work such as scything and pruning, or just general 'pitching in' such as clean-ups. New Cherry Trees

Visitors to the trefoil will have seen 15 sturdy cherry trees, planted in May. They, with a further one to be planted in the Autumn, include 10 varieties new to the park: the variety will offer more both to the eye in terms of shape and colour of the blossom, and to a wider range of pollinators.

We are grateful to Edinburgh and Lothians Greenspace Trust, who managed the planting, to the Council for identifying suitable varieties and removing the old trees – and in particular, to the AEB Charitable Trust, who in 2021 generously awarded us £5000 to cover the trees, planting and after-care, and have been patient over the year's (Covid-19 related) delay in completing the project.
