


## Newsletter of the Friends of Braidburn Valley Park

### The Day Arrived

The Council Park's Department had made a start the previous day by turning back some turf ready for planting the bulbs.

10.00am -Those who arrived started preparing more holes – we had 50,000 bulbs to plant! Others went to help the Scouts who were supplying and erecting the marquees and to collect the tables and chairs from Greenbank Parish Church. James Hunter, Parks Development Officer, arrived with the bulbs and spades and Karen Hayes, Urban Forestry, arrived with more spades.

In no time at all, the marquees were set up, the tables and chairs were put in place, the refreshments were laid out, the bulbs and spades placed at strategic points and everything put in order. Time for the workers to have a "cuppa" and a bite before the guests arrived.

1.45pm - The guests started to appear. "Friends" and neighbours complete with spades made themselves useful cutting more holes, the Guides and Brownies from 1935 started to arrive - a bit shy at first, then gradually they saw faces they recognised and the tongues started wagging!

2.15pm - Fiona Watt and her present day Guides, Brownies and Rainbows arrived and battle commenced! Everyone got down to the task in hand with such gusto! The poor diggers had a job on their hands trying to keep one hole ahead of the planters! With an estimated 250 people there we certainly drew a lot of attention from the passers-by. By the end of the day we had planted approx 23,000 bulbs!!!

In the mean time, the 1935 troop planted some bulbs, went off to see if

they could find their cherry tree or just sat in the Marquee and had a cup of tea and a chat.

It was good to see the Minister for the Environment, Transport and Life Long Learning, Iain Gray MSP and his wife Gil, Councillors, Lindsay Walls and Daphne Sleigh and Jim McKay Acting Head of Leisure Development giving up their Sunday afternoon to come along and give their support. I think they may even have planted a bulb or two!

**4.00pm** - After a hard afternoons work the young planters broke off for some much earned refreshments, kindly sponsored by McAdam's SSC, while the 1935 Troop, our Guests of Honour retired to the Braid Hills Hotel for some (more) tea and refreshments.

**5.00pm** - Everyone had left and surprise, surprise, there was not one piece of litter left to show we had been there! What a magnificent effort from everyone.

The whole committee sincerely hope you all enjoyed the day as much as you seemed to, I know we all did. After such a successful day all I can say is. let's do it again, in the Spring!!!
