Infrastructure Improvements in the Park

The Park has been successful in attracting capital money from the Council Parks Department to improve some of its infrastructure. As a result, the path on the east side of the burn between the middle and Oxgangs bridges has been upgraded from a loose gravel surface to a fully road metalled path.

A new pedestrian bridge is planned for the north end of the park, crossing the burn just before the culvert under Comiston Road. The bridge should reduce the need for people to scramble around the culvert. It will offer an additional connection to the informal paths in the north east of the park, although there are no plans for improving these at present.

The Friends have raised concerns about the poor standards of grass cutting in the park in the 2007 and 2008 seasons. Tyre marks gouged into soft earth, scalped sections of grass and muddy ruts are a result of very heavy machinery being driven too fast in conditions when the ground is too soft. Edinburgh Council is aware of the concern and are promising better results for 2009.

Awards Galore!

Earlier this year, Karen Young, the Friends of Braidburn Valley Park Chairperson for the last four years received an Edinburgh Council "Inspiring Volunteering" Achievement Award from Lord Provost George Grubb. Shortly after, Karen also received a South Edinburgh Local Hero Award from Nigel Griffiths MP. Karen pointed out that all of the Committee should receive these awards because everyone gives so much time and effort to make the park a better place for us all.

Also on awards, the park was part of the judges' tour for Edinburgh's entry to the Beautiful

Scotland award. In a quick visit, the judges admired the Green Flag, interpretation panel, bulb and tree planting and took away information about community events and education projects. Edinburgh won a Silver Gilt Award in the Beautiful Scotland City Category 2008, and was overall champion for the first time ever.

These awards cap a great year for Braidburn Valley Park which is one of five parks in Scotland to receive the prestigious Green Flag Award which is now flying on the newly greased flagpole.

News from the Treasurer

At the AGM, it was agreed that our financial year would end on 31st October, so that audited figures could be presented at each AGM. Despite the Fun Day returning a deficit, due mainly to bad weather, the period to 31st October ended in a 'break even'. We are very grateful to our continuing members and several sponsors, who have made this possible.

It was decided that we would offer members the opportunity to pay their subscription by Standing Order, which cuts down on the administration for future years. By now all members have been notified and I am pleased to report that

the subs are rolling in and that about a third of members (so far) have opted for a Standing Order. If you haven't already renewed your subscription, please do so before 31st January 2009.

Application has been made to The Office of the Charity Regulator for Scotland for The Friends to be awarded Charitable Status. There are tax advantages in doing this, the prime one being that members will be able to "gift aid" their subscriptions. If successful, members will be asked to sign a declaration that they pay UK Tax.
