#### What A Difference Volunteers Make

Our monthly work parties continue to make a difference to the park with regular attacks on the invasive Japanese butterbur by the Braid Burn, and recent extensive planting of young barerooted shrub whips to produce an under-storey beneath the tree canopy. Japanese butterbur has been hit hard at the bridge beneath the electricity sub station. A good number of whips were planted to the north of the old toilet block, taking care not to interfere with established sledge runs in the area.

The continuing efforts of the Duke of Edinburgh Award volunteers and their supervisor, Charles Black, merit particular mention as they are key members of any work party. A typical session included piling cherry logs for wildlife (not burning!), checking young trees, and clearing shrubs on the Fly Walk.

Our work parties are social affairs and not hard work! Please join us for an hour on the second Sunday of the month. Meet at the main gates at 2pm.

# **Margaret Ramsay Remembered**

We were saddened last October, to learn of the death of Margaret Ramsay. She lived in Greenbank Crescent most of her married life and brought up her children to love the park, for its nature, its views and as a safe place for them, and for walking the family dogs.

Margaret was a founder member of The Friends and, although she did not serve on any committees, she was our 'eyes and ears' for any 'goings on' in the Park; the first to alert us of rubbish in the burn, tree damage and on one occasion that the Interpretation Panel at the Greenbank Entrance had been pulled from its fixing.

It was only proper that Margaret should be

remembered in a tangible way, and so a tree was dedicated in her memory on the day of the Annual General Meeting. Margaret's family took part in the planting. Andrew Swann our Chairman said a few complimentary words about Margaret, before her children and grand-children planted the tree. David, her son, spoke fondly of his mother and of the good times that the family had enjoyed in the park.

The tree is situated on the east bank of the burn between the stage and the middle bridge marked by a memorial plaque – a fitting tribute to a very special park user.

#### 400 more Plants in our Wildflower Meadow

On the same day as the Spring Clean this year, over 400 mixed flower plugs were planted in the wildflower meadow at the south end of the Park. The plugs had been grown from seed last year and over-wintered in a local garden. Species including cranesbill, harebell, bellflower and toadflax were planted to augment the existing range of these flowers, and eight adults and four children had an enjoyable time sharing the planting work among them (left). Since then the plugs have established themselves very well and are growing fast, so that the young plants are already improving the habitat for wildlife.

### The Guides and the Bumble Bees

The Fairmilehead Guides and two Committee members, Karen Young and Keith Knight, spent a very successful May evening in the Park providing underground nests for increasingly rare bumble bees. Keith designed a prototype bee box that has not been used before. The Guides were very enthusiastic at making nests, and even more keen about burying them. There are six boxes on the south side of the stakes that mark the southern boundary of the wildflower meadow. There is only a small part of the entrance tube sticking up when you have buried the nests properly, and so the sites are marked with a discrete cane, meaning the entrances can be found again even when the bumble bees have not begun to use them.
