Jim Lavin

We were saddened to read of the death of Jim Lavin on 10th October 2017. Jim and his wife

Sheila were members of the working party of local residents who worked along with the Head of Parks, Jim Mackay, to establish the planting of the "millennium forest" trees. When Jim urged the members of the working party to form a Friends Group, all were delighted when Jim announced that he had ideas about what could be achieved and that he would work to create the Group. Jim got a story in the Edinburgh Evening News inviting any former Girl Guides, who had planted the cherry trees in 1936, to come

along to a bulb planting in the park on 13th October 2002. He encouraged local Guide

and Scout organisations along with local residents in Greenbank to participate. He set

up a stall and asked for volunteers to join the group and The Friends of Braidburn Valley Park was formed.

So, it is thanks to Jim that we now have this well-established group. Jim had good credentials for the task. He had worked as a sales executive with a global company and, after early retirement, set himself up as a sales advisor. Once the Friends group was established, he withdrew to the background, and Lindsay Walls was elected Chair for a stint, finding that Jim had left a good committee to oversee the

work. Jim and Sheila moved to Bo'ness a few years ago.
